### Terrorists reveal PKK-PYD link: Turkish security source

Two captured PYD terrorists have outlined links between Syrian and PKK group, says gendarmerie source



Two captured terrorists of the armed wing People's Protection Units (YPG) of the Democratic Union Party (PYD) have outlined the links and the extent of the cooperation between the Syrian groups and the PKK. A source within the intelligence department of the gendarme-

ern Sanliurfa province told Anadolu Agency that the suspects -- Mesut C. (29) and Abdurrahman P. (23) -- were arrested by local security forces while trying to cross from the Syrian border town of Kobani to the district of Mursitpinar in Sanliurfa. The source failed to specify when

Ankara considers the PYD, YPG and the PKK to be terrorist outfits, and has frequently pointed to the link between these groups active in Turkey and Syria. The PYD is known as the PKK's Syrian affiliate. The source said Mesut C., who allegedly joined the PKK in 2005, was sent from the Qandil mountains -location of the PKK stronghold in Iraq -- to Kobani in 2014 to join in clashes against Daesh.

Kobani witnessed heavy fighting between Daesh and the PYD in late 2014 and early 2015.

Still according to the intelligence department source, he said that he later traveled to Turkey to operate a sniper in the Sur district of the southeastern Diyarbakir province to

support PKK forces. Code-named Diren (Resist) Mesut C. reportedly said that the PKK had recently sent snipers to Turkey.

Meanwhile, code-named Tirej, Abdurrahman P. allegedly asserted that troops used drugs to give themselves courage during clashes.

He also reportedly said that the PKK had suffered heavy losses in Sur, Cizre and Silopi districts in southeastern and had requested snipers from PYD-YPG forces.

Security forces said they had seized an M-16 infantry rifle, two Kalashnikov rifles, eight grenades, drugs, two YPG uniforms, a detailed map of the Sur district and organizational documents on the terrorists.

### US 'very sensitive' Turkish president to Turkey's YPG commemorates concerns

'We need to respect Turkey's concerns, and we will, we have, we believe,' Kerry



The U.S. is "very sensitive" to Turkey's concerns regarding the YPG, America's top diplomat said Thursday. John Kerry told lawmakers the U.S. has been talking "considerably" with Turkey regarding the dispute the two countries have about the group in Syria.

The YPG is the armed wing of the PKK's Syrian affiliate PYD.

Turkey considers all three terrorist groups, but the U.S. names only PKK as a terrorist entity and says the YPG a "reliable partner" fighting Daesh in northern Syria.

"We need to respect Turkey's concerns, and we will, we have, we believe," Kerry said.

"Going forward is very important that there not be a different problem created by the short-term solution of working with the Kurds, and then that creates a longer-term challenge for all of us in the region. So we're working very, very carefully." Citing the recapture of the city of Kobani in northern Syria by Kurdish forces, Kerry said local ground forces are needed in order to fight Daesh. "There are different Kurds because some are more prepared and more comfortable working with Turkey than others are, and those divisions are very complicated and need to be managed carefully," he said.

# **Khojaly Massacre**

Armenian forces took over the town of Khojaly in Nagorno-Karabakh on Feb. 26, 1992, killing more than 600 Azeri citizens



Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan commemorated on Friday the 1992 Khojaly Massacre.

"I wish Allah's mercy for those killed during the Khojaly Massacre," Erdogan said during the opening ceremony of Turkish Vakifbank's Islamic branch in Istanbul. The massacre on February 25-26, 1992, is regarded as one of the bloodiest and most controversial incidents of the war between Ar-

menia and Azerbaijan for control of the Nagorno-Karabakh region. Armenian forces took over the town of Khojaly in Nagorno-Karabakh on Feb. 26 after battering it with heavy artillery and tanks, assisted by an infantry regiment.

The two-hour offensive killed 613 Azeri citizens, including 116 women and 63 children and critically injured 487 others, according to Azeri figures.

Various memorials have been held around Turkey to commemorate the massacre.

Turkish presidential spokesman Ibrahim Kalin said Friday that Turkey condemned "inhumane attack against civilians" and declared solidarity with Azerbaijani people. >>MORE DETAILS

## Turkey fears for Syria deal amid Russia, regime attacks



Ankara has expressed grave concern over the future of the recent U.S.-Russia agreement aimed at halting the ongoing hostilities in Syria.

"We support this ceasefire in principle but the continuous bombardment by Russian jets and ground offensives by Assad forces cause serious concerns for us regarding the future of the truce," Turkish presidential spokesman Ibrahim Kalin told a news briefing at the presidential complex on Friday.

Earlier this week, Washington and Moscow announced a "cessation of hostilities" in Syria that is scheduled to take effect at midnight Friday local time. It is hoped the deal will allow aid to be delivered to desperate Syrians.

Daesh and al-Qaeda's Syrian affiliate, the Nusra Front, are excluded from the agreement During remarks made on Thursday, Turkish Prime Minister Ahmet Davutoglu said that Ankara will neither hesitate to do what is necessary nor seek permission from anyone in case of a threat against its security

from any party in Syria. "All must know that this ceasefire is only valid for Syria and the warring sides in the country," he told the media during a trip to Turkey's Konya province. "If any of them poses a threat to Turkey's security, it becomes

non-binding for us." Kalin also echoed Davutoglu's remarks, saying: "Turkey will use its rights originating from international law and apply the rules of engagement to protect its national security -- if necessary -- no matter from which part of Syria or from which terrorist group the threat

Turkey's military shelled PYD/YPG positions in northern Syria for a week beginning Feb. 13 in response to artillery fire from PYD forces based around Aleppo's Azaz town, located just six kilometers (four miles) from the Turkish border.

The YPG, the armed wing of the PYD, has been supported by U.S. airstrikes in its fight against Daesh and more recently by Russian warplanes as it seeks to gain further ground while opposition groups face regime offensives in northern Syria. Ankara sees all three -- the

### **Davutoglu: Turkey not** bound by Syria deal

PM says Turkey would 'not seek permission from anyone' when it came to maintaining the country's security"



Turkey is not bound by the U.S.-Russia agreement to halt hostilities in Syria, Prime Minister Ahmet Davutoglu said Thursday.

"All must know that this ceasefire is only valid for Syria and the warring sides in the country," he told the media during a trip to Konya province. "If any of them poses a threat to Turkey's security, it becomes non-binding for us."

He added: "Turkey will not seek permission from anyone when it comes to its own security but will do the necessary. Because when it happens, it becomes an issue not only for Syria but also for Turkey." Washington and Moscow this week

announced a "cessation of hostilities" in Syria that is scheduled to take effect at midnight Friday local time. It is hoped the deal will allow aid to be delivered to desperate Syrians.

Daesh and al-Qaeda's Syrian affiliate, the Nusra Front, are excluded from the agreement. Davutoglu criticized the lack of reference to the Syrian affiliates of the PKK, which resumed its 30-year armed campaign against the Turkish state in late July 2015. The YPG, the armed wing of the PYD, has been supported by U.S. airstrikes in its fight against Daesh and more recently by Russian warplanes as it sought to expand its territory in northern Syria. "The YPG is a terrorist organization for us, just like Daesh and al-Nusra," Davutoglu said, referring to al-Qaeda's Syrian branch. ### Turkey's **Coast Guard** sees 1,000% increase in migrants



Turkey's Coast Guard has said that the number of migrants discovered in the country's Aegean region has risen by 1,000 percent since the same period in 2015. Almost 6,800 migrants -mostly from Syria, Afghanistan and Iraq -- were found by the Turkish authorities in the first 24 days of February, according to fresh data.

This compares to around 600 migrants who were detained in February last year.
